


Ever since my first day here at Elon, Catholic Campus Ministry welcomed me into the ministry and challenged me to grow in my faith as well as in every aspect of my life. With the help of CCM, I found that sense of community at Elon I was looking for while providing an opportunity to grow closer to Christ. One of the most impactful relationships I have formed in this community is with Trung Huynh-Duc, the Director of Catholic Life here at Elon. T was there to welcome me into CCM; he was a big reason why I continued to be a part of this community and eventually become a student leader. We started to get to know each other over shared meals where T would invite me to talk about anything I wanted to. I was introduced to my first discipleship meeting with T and discovered a new way to engage in my faith.

As the year rolled along, we continued to meet, and I found myself excited for future meetings. T encouraged me to apply to be a Servant Leader and also to join EC Reach More. Reach More is a ten-week program led by CCM in partnership with Evangelical Catholic (a national organization that serves parishes and university ministries across the nation to launch evangelizing movements in their communities). The goal of Reach More is to dive deeper into how to be a disciple while learning how to walk with others as they encounter Jesus and begin their own journeys of discipleship. Going through that program and being a student leader allowed me to develop emotionally and spiritually in ways I could not have imagined. I started to get more comfortable in prayer. I would read and study scripture during personal prayer times and with T. I also found myself applying the teachings of the bible in my daily life. T was there as a mentor every step of the way; I am so thankful for his wisdom and support of my growth as a leader. Looking back, I am grateful for his encouragement because I may have passed up on those incredible opportunities otherwise.

Most importantly, T was there for me as a brother in Christ. He taught me that it means to love others as oneself, to do good work in the community around us, and to work together to welcome others, just as he welcomed me into his life. How Far We've Come

A conversation with Chris Peden '93 and Andi Urvina '95

It is always incredible to be able to catch up with our alumni. CCM had the immense pleasure of a recent Zoom call with Chris Peden from the class of 1993, and Andrea (Andi) Lauri Urvina from the class of 1995. Chris was president of CCM in 1990 and then served as the CCM treasurer in 1991 and 1992. Andi was also heavily involved in CCM, often serving as a lector at Mass.

CCM was much smaller back then. "We were called the Newman Society and we used to go door-to-door trying to get people to join," recalled Chris. Even though Catholicism was the largest single denomination on campus (as it is today), it was hard to get students to participate. Mass was held in an upper room of the Long building, with anywhere between 15-30 people in attendance, and then the weekly CCM meeting was held afterwards.

Chris, Andi, and other classmates were motivated to grow the organization. "I remember writing our constituation along with Joe Stanko, Mike, Alicia...," shared Chris. They created cups to give away as promotional items and printed flyers to advertise on campus. "We used WordPerfect to create flyers and then had to take it to get approved before printing. And there was no color toner!"

One of the events they had was a retreat to the beach. "The beach retreat was not necessarily just for Catholics," Andi explained. "We wanted a time for as many of us to get together." It turns out that it was the start of a great tradition that CCM continues to hold to this day.

Other things that Chris and Andi remembered was how the Holland House served as the University Chaplain's residence after it had served as the home for past Elon Presidents. They were excited to hear that it is now the home to the Catholic Newman Center on campus. They were even more incredulous to hear how CCM currently has student Engagement Interns that reach out actively to every single first-year student who identified as Catholic.

Andi currently works as a registered nurse in Connecticut, is happily married to her husband Miguel, and is mother to a son and a daughter. Chris Peden is the owner of Peden Accounting Services in northern Virginia, a husband, and a father to two boys. Chris actually met his wife through the Newman Society at Elon. Andi and Chris are both proud of the organization they helped to grow.

"Sometimes it felt like we were just holding the kite strings," Chris said. They wanted to keep the Catholic faith alive on campus until others were able to come and continue the ministry. "It's amazing where you are now." CCM is now thriving with an incredible student Servant Leadership team, Engagement interns, Music interns, and numerous activities and events for students. And it's thanks to alumni like Andi, Chris, and countless others who prioritized their faith at Elon!


