So You Want to Be Confirmed?

A Student's Experience with RCJA

For many Catholics, the sacrament of Confirmation is logically the next step after Baptism and receiving First Communion. Some receive Confirmation when they are young while others such as myself wait until young adulthood to receive the sacrament. RCIA, or the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults, is a process that one goes through before being confirmed.

At first, I thought that RCIA was just another mechanism that the Catholic Church had devised to make me feel guilty for having lost touch with my faith. At first, I didn't always enjoy having to rush after class on Friday afternoons to the Truitt Center to make it in time for my meetings with Fr. Gerry. Yet, as I understood that RCIA was a process and experience in which I rediscovered and came to understand my faith, it no longer felt like a chore.

There were times where I had doubts about RCIA and the journey of my faith. Was I really doing the "right" thing and was I getting confirmed because I wanted to, or was it because I had to? The Blessed Sacrament and St. Ju-

lia Confirmation Retreat, which took place in Burlington, NC, on Saturday, March 6, helped me answer my questions. At the retreat, which was led by many fellow Catholic students at Elon, I began to notice how my relationship with my faith and others had changed. I developed strong relationships with CCM members, of whom two are my Confirmation sponsors, as well as a deeper and more meaningful relationship with God.

I am thrilled to have been confirmed with other collegiate students in the Diocese of Raleigh on April 9th, and I can't wait to move forward in my relationships with God, CCM, and those who have stood by me throughout this RCIA process.

Another Big Success



Fourteen members of the Elon CCM community recently spent their spring break in Mt. Pleasant, SC, volunteering for Habitat for Humanity. The thirteen Elon students and one recent Elon grad arrived at their residence, the Isle of Palms Baptist Church, on Sunday, March 21st, and spent four days of their week-long spring break on a worksite for East Cooper Habitat. A typical day for the group included breakfast and travel to the worksite, several hours of service for Habitat (generally from 8:30 AM to 3:00 PM), an afternoon at the beach, supper, and prayer and reflection time before bed.

The group worked on their Habitat house Monday, Tuesday, and Friday, and was immediately welcomed by Kate, the on-site supervisor, a host of regular volunteers, and Mike, a supervisor from a nearby Habitat build. The extraordinary charisma and enthusiasm of the East Cooper team combined with the high energy of the Elon volunteers was unstoppable, and the week ended with the build ahead of schedule. It was a dramatic change: on Monday, little more was visible than several concrete columns and a few piles of dirt. During the week, the group framed and laid the floor supports, hammered together the pre-builds for the walls and window frames, and constructed almost an entire tool shed to boot. Finally on Friday, the Elon volunteers cheered as they raised and secured the outer walls of the house.

Of course, it wouldn't be spring break without a little recreation. During their free time on Wednesday, the group visited Boone Hall Plantation in nearby Charleston (a filming site for the movie "The Notebook"), where they toured the plantation house and slave quarters, rode though the extensive grounds, and participated in a live Gullah performance. They ate dinner in Charleston on Wednesday, and were also able to revisit the historic city on Friday, where they strolled down the Battery and went on an evening ghost tour.

It goes without saying that all involved had an incredibly rewarding and memorable experience this spring break. It is extremely humbling to give up one's spare time and personal space, and to consider the circumstances of those less fortunate. On the same note, however, it is truly inspiring and empowering to know that there are good-hearted, like-minded people out there, doing their part to help others and make the world a little brighter. Our volunteers returned to Elon on Saturday, March 27th counting their blessings and eager to share the hope and the energy that they experienced over their meaningful time on CCM's Alternative Spring Break.
